Rejoice!

Today is Laetare Sunday, the Lenten Sunday to rejoice. We are encouraged to rejoice, not because Lent is half over, but because something extraordinary has occurred. All three readings for today applaud some wondrous and joyous occasion.

The reading from Joshua notes the end of the Israelites' grueling Egyptian and wilderness experience. They settled in Canaan and now celebrated the anniversary of their deliverance by offering to God in gratitude the fruits of their own harvest. The people who once were landless have now been made anew. This is surely a reason to rejoice.

Paul's words to the Corinthians were reason for great rejoicing. He assured them that, because of the death and resurrection of Jesus, their sinfulness was not held against them. Instead, they were now reconciled with God. They were a new creation. This too is reason to rejoice.

Jesus' story about the merciful father touches every

life. The young son turned away from his home and his family, yet it was the father's actions that brought about the reconciliation. The story did not explicitly say that he simply forgave his son. More than that, it says that he was filled with deep compassion for him—a compassion that restored the bond between them. This compassion brought the son who was dead back to life. There is no greater reason for rejoicing.

God has brought us into a new land, has made each of us a new creation, has brought us back to the embrace of our Father. And so, we rejoice.

PASTOR'S PARAGRAPHS

4th Sunday in Lent March 27, 2022

We are rapidly approaching the most solemn and important week of the liturgical year, Holy Week. This Sunday is the beginning of Passiontide, which is the final two weeks of Lent. In preparation, I would like to highlight certain features of each day, and give you a better sense of their symbolic significance.

PALM SUNDAY: Palm Sunday is called this because of the palm branches we receive at the beginning of holy Mass. You will recall that the faithful spread palms across the road when Jesus entered the Holy City (see Lk. 19:36). These are symbols of our lives. As the faithful laid palm branches in honor of their Savior back then, so we symbolically lay down our lives as Jesus enters Holy Week with us. You will notice that Our Lord rode into Jerusalem on a mule. This is significant because military heroes often rode in on horses, but Jesus came in on a mule in order to symbolize the humility that characterized His mission on earth. He was not a mighty earthly king, but a humble Savior. We read one of the accounts of the Lord's Passion (Matthew, Mark, or Luke) and receive Holy Communion at Mass. We have begun our journey to the Lord's Passion. Death, and Resurrection. As a note, please dispose of your palms by burning, burying, or putting them behind a picture in your house because they are blessed.

HOLY THURSDAY: After the weekdays of Holy Week (Wednesday of which is called "Spy Wednesday" because Scripture tells us it is the day Judas betrayed our Lord (Mt. 26:14-16), we begin the Triduum or three solemn days of Holy Week itself. Two significant sacraments were instituted on this night (Holy Orders and Holy Eucharist). The faithful gather in the early evening to celebrate the institution of the Eucharist. At Mass, the priest says, "On the night he was betrayed . . ." meaning on the night in which Judas led the soldiers to arrest Jesus, Our Lord gathered the Apostles in the Upper Room (which we saw in Deacon Jim's powerful presentation last weekend) and instituted the Eucharist. At the end of the celebration, Jesus and the Apostles went into the Garden of Gethsemane, where He was arrested and bound in chains. We symbolically represent this arrest by carrying the Eucharist in procession to a side tabernacle. It remains there until Easter.

GOOD FRIDAY: The Lord's death is remembered every Good Friday. We gather for a liturgy of the Word, veneration of the Cross, and Holy Communion. There is no Mass this day. No bells are rung and the holy water stoups or fonts are emptied. We hear John's account of the Lord's suffering and death. Then we come forward to venerate the holy Cross. You notice that the priest even removes his shoes to venerate the Cross. This is a solemn day of reflection on the death of Jesus. The tabernacle remains off to the side so the faithful may quietly adore the Lord.

EASTER: After forty long days, we celebrate Easter. The church is lit with candles and beautiful lilies and mums decorate the altar. We sing the Gloria and Alleluia again! Jesus is risen! This is a day to celebrate the greatest miracle ever done, the raising of Jesus Christ from the dead. An Easter fire (representing the fire of Mt. Sinai) is and Easter Candle (representing the risen Christ) are blessed at the Easter Vigil, several readings are read, and candidates for baptism and confirmation are brought into the Church. As we near Holy Week, please take extra time to pray, fast, and reflect on the mystery of our salvation in Christ. The more you put into Holy Week, the more you get out of it.



Choose one of the following activities as a way to further reflect on the Sunday readings: (Copyright © 1996-2012, Our Sunday Visitor, Inc. All rights reserved.)

- The Gospel reading for Sunday is one of the most familiar stories in the Bible. Read with your family the story of the return of the prodigal son, Luke 15:1-3, 11-32. After the reading, list the steps of reconciliation identified in the story.
- Prepare your family's favorite meal. Before the meal, ask family members to share stories about a time when they were grateful for the gift of forgiveness that someone in your family offered them.
- Talk about your experiences of forgiveness and reconciliation in the family. Discuss: What does a falling out between family members do to our home environment? What signs do we use to ask forgiveness? What signs do we use to tell one another that we forgive them?
- Agree, as a family, to celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation together with the Parish family during Lent. Check to see that everyone is comfortable and remembers how to participate in the sacrament. Plan a family treat after the celebration.
